WORKSHOP 1: "Creating a Stronger Social-Emotional Climate in the Classroom"

Facilitated by Professor Iram Siraj, this workshop will introduce the Sustained Shared Thinking and Emotional Wellbeing (SSTEW) scale and how it can be used by teachers and practitioners to improve high quality interactions, children's behaviour and create a strong social emotional climate.

WORKSHOP 2: "How to Self-Assess the nutrition and physical activity environments in Early Stage 1 and make changes based on the results"

Facilitated by Professor Dianne Ward, this workshop will show educators and practitioners how to conduct a selfassessment of the nutrition, physical activity, outdoor play, and screen time in their classroom using the Go NAP SACC (Nutrition and Physical Activity Self-Assessment in Child Care) instrument, and discuss how this assessment can be used to develop more effective classroom programs.
